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HOPE OF ESCAPE FILM STILLS



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LOGLINE & SYNOPSIS

LOGLINE: Hope of Escape is a historical drama based on a true story that follows the incredible journey of an enslaved mother (Diana) and daughter (Cornelia) who must escape before they are sold and separated forever. Their only hope is to connect with their free relatives in the North and convince the most powerful abolitionists of their time to help them.

SYNOPSIS (100 WORDS): The patriarch of a rice plantation in Charleston, South Carolina abruptly dies, and his next of kin feud over the assets. A house servant all her life, Diana and her daughter are at the mercy of their new master who is conflicted about following his dead father's wishes – that Diana should be free. A star-studded "cast" of historic characters include abolitionist Julia Williams; famous orator Henry Highland Garnet, and renowned abolitionists William Lloyd Garrison and Lewis Tappan. Now a rescue effort, that involves hundreds of people, offers a ray of hope as the countdown begins for Diana and Cornelia's escape.

LONG DESCRIPTION (135 WORDS)

Hope of Escape offers an alternative to the conventional Hollywood portrayal of slavery, diverging from the prevailing Hollywood trope of excessive violence and victimization. Instead, it delves into the lesser-known facet of slavery, the "above-ground Underground Railroad," a clandestine movement where enslaved individuals were liberated through ransom payments to their masters (by their families, mostly in the North), akin to Frederick Douglass's path to freedom.

It "took a village" to fundraise and emancipate an enslaved person. Hope of Escape vividly illustrates how Diana and Cornelia depended on a complex network of abolitionists, both within and beyond the United States.

Hope of Escape highlights the resilience of both free and enslaved families who, despite being separated by time and thousands of miles, managed to keep their connections, holding on to the hope of a brighter future.



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DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

Films about Black history are more crucial than ever, especially in light of the recent attacks on teaching Black history in schools and the pulling of books in libraries. I feel Hope of Escape is an important chapter in Black history and I hope its story will inspire others to continue to research, tell stories, and teach about the historic lives of Black people in America.

The urgency to tell more stories about women of color in history is clear. They are unsung heroes. There has been a positive increase of African American women protagonists in historical dramas over the years, such as Hidden Figures (2016), Harriet (2019), and Passing (2021). These films are few and far between and the need for more independent voices is paramount to level the playing field. I feel I am also making a statement to support other filmmakers: Should only studios with really big budgets have the right to tell these important stories in history? I think not. Luckily for me, all I have to do is look back into my own family history to find stories about courageous black women. I strive to combat the worn out and monolithic stereotypes of enslaved people being complete victims without agency. Hope of Escape reveals the complex lives of black women from a variety of experiences and perspectives that played out in antebellum south and in the abolitionist hubs of the north.

This film underscores the undeniable importance of historical narratives that focus on Black lives. It champions the heroism of enslaved Americans and courageous abolitionist allies who, in the tumultuous decades leading up to the Civil War, risked everything to combat the scourge of slavery. The story is made intensely personal by its connection to my own ancestry, with Cornelia and William as my great, great grandparents, and Diana as my great, great grandmother.



DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT CONTINUED


From my early years, I have known a great deal about my African American forebears, particularly the captivating life of William Benjamin Gould, affectionately known as "Wilby" in the film, my great, great grandfather. I happen to have access to a diary that Gould kept during his escape and continued to write as a sailor for the Union during the Civil War. I do feel, though, that the stories of William Gould and other male relatives have often dominated my family narrative and obscured stories about the amazing women in my family who were just as significant and brave. My film strives to highlight their experiences and to espouse their achievements.

Moreover, this film serves as an opportunity to shed light on the significant roles Black women played in the anti-slavery and abolitionist movements of the 19th century, roles that have long been obscured by their husbands' legacies. Julia Williams, my great, great aunt, a formidable anti-slavery advocate in her own right, remains overshadowed by her husband Henry Highland Garnet, despite her invaluable contributions in crafting his speeches and leading Black communities alongside him.

Although my film is a very personal exploration, I wish to add another perspective to our collective historical memory as a U.S. citizen and a descendant of slaves. Along this line, my film specifically explores the experiences of mixed-race slaves, sired by their white masters, with all of the advantages and disadvantages. The film also shows how it sometimes "took a village" to emancipate a slave, and how much my own family depended on a complex network of activists, both inside and outside the country. We see how, even though separated for many years and by thousands of miles, families (both free and enslaved) managed to keep connections with each other, holding onto hope that their circumstances would change for the better.

I believe that the women in my family, like countless others, carried a fierce hope within them during slavery, enduring so that their descendants, including myself, can continue the fight & aspire to escape the nightmare of institutional slavery. In a small way, Hope of Escape is part of that fight.





PROTAGNISTS



MIZAN KIRBY (DIANA)

Kirby is a New York based actress with decades of experience on the stage and screen. She has played a range of roles, such as Bessie Coleman in Only the Sky is Free (dir. Duane Jones), Valaida in Hot Snow (dir. Imani Douglas of DramaLeague), and Amanda in Sherlock Holmes and the Hands of Othello. Kirby also has extensive training in improvisation. A tribute to Kirby's work is highlighted in the book, The History of African American Theatre, by Errol G. Hill.



KENDRA CHIDEYA (CORNELIA)

Chideya is an Elon University grad with a degree in BFA Acting. She has performed in & directed several film & theater productions, including School for Wives (Enrique), Dog Sees God (Van's Sister U/S), and Twelfth Night (Attendant). She debuted virtually in theatrical production, "Pheromone: An Awkward Olfactory Inquiry," by Rachel Graf Evans & directed by Kevin Hoffmann. She wrapped on a film, set to premiere 2023, & landed the lead role in a mini-series now in production.



MARLEY GREGORY (WILBY)

Gregory is a theatrically trained actor with nearly a decade of experience. He has performed across the U.S. and twice in London, England at the International Youth Arts Festival (IYAF) during the summers of 2014 and 2015 at the Rose Theatre. His recent lead performance in Garden of the Gods garnered him a nomination for "Best Actor" at the Georgia Shorts Film Festival, where the film won "Best Horror". Disney has hired him to perform in shows at Disney World in Florida.



Amy Gerber - Writer, Director, Producer

Amy has produced and directed independent films for over 25 years. Her films have won honors at numerous national and international film festivals. She also has directed art films for the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Amy's films primarily explore the intersections of memory, culture, and history. In addition to her directing work, she served as a casting associate on 12 major motion pictures in the 90s, including titles like Angels In The Outfield, Tank Girl, Goldeneye, and The Mask of Zorro. She has worked for all the major studios in Hollywood including Disney, Warner Bros., and Columbia Pictures. Amy holds an M.F.A. in Film/Video from the California Institute of the Arts and currently chairs the film department at Hollins University in Roanoke, Virginia, where she teaches production, animation, and film studies.

Suzanne Stroh, Producer

Suzanne has significant film experience as a writer and producer. She was the first screenwriter on the BBC's four hour miniseries Portrait of a Marriage (1990). With filmmaker Lavinia Currier, Suzanne co-wrote the screenplay for Oka! (2011: Dada Films). It premiered at Telluride and opened its theatrical run at Angelika Film Center. Suzanne's historical drama Scotch Verdict has won awards at film festivals in the US, Germany, France, Spain, and Mexico, and Great Britain. The Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts adapted and staged a production of the script in 2015 and made it part of their curriculum. Suzanne has produced two projects for FlatCoatFilms: My Grandfather was a Nazi Scientist (2012) and Public Memory (2004: Cinema Guild).


April Marcel, Co-Producer
